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The object of *Gut* is to publish original papers and reviews concerned with practice and research in the field of gastroenterology. The field is that of alimentary, hepatic, or pancreatic disease, and papers may cover the medical, surgical, radiological, or historical aspects. They may also deal with the basic sciences concerned with the alimentary tract, including experimental work. The report of a single case will be accepted only if it is of sufficient interest in relation to a wider field of research.

There will be a section devoted to short papers on laboratory and surgical techniques and methods of investigation where these are not part of a lesser survey.

COMMUNICATIONS Papers should be addressed to the Editor, *Gut*, B.M.A. House, Tavistock Square, London, WC1H 9JR. Papers are accepted only on the understanding that they are not published elsewhere without previous sanction of the Editorial Board. They should be in double-spaced typewriting on one side of the paper only. On the paper the name of the author should appear with initials (or distinguishing Christian name) only, and the name and address of the hospital or laboratory where the work was performed. A definition of the position held by each of the authors in the hospital or laboratory should be stated in a covering letter to the Editor. Communications should be kept short, and illustrations should be included when necessary; coloured illustrations are allowed only if monochrome will not satisfactorily demonstrate the condition. It is not desirable that results should be shown both as tables and graphs.

ILLUSTRATIONS Diagrams should be drawn in Indian ink on white paper, Bristol board, or blue-squared paper. The legends for illustrations should be typed on a separate sheet and numbered to conform with the relevant illustrations. Photographs and photomicrographs should be on glossy paper, unmounted. TABLES should not be included in the body of the text, but should be typed on a separate sheet.

ABBREVIATIONS In general, symbols and abbreviations should be those used by British Chemical and Physiological Abstracts. In any paper concerning electrolyte metabolism, it is desirable that data be calculated as m-equiv/l. as well as (or alternatively to) mg/100 ml.

REFERENCES These should be made by inserting the name of the author followed by year of publication in brackets. At the end of the paper, references should be arranged in alphabetical order of authors' names. Such references should give author's name, followed by initials and year of publication in brackets, the title of the article quoted, the name of the journal in which the article appeared, the volume number in arabic numerals, followed by the numbers of first and last pages of the article. Abbreviations are according to *World Medical Periodicals* (published by B.M.A. for World Medical Association), thus: Chandler, G. N., Cameron, A. D., Nunn, A. H., and Street, D. F. (1960). 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developed vasculitis associated with cryoglobulin-aemia, a hitherto unrecognized association.

All four patients had a rash, similar to that found in patients with cryoglobulinaemia, but in only two were there episodes of Raynaud's phenomenon. The histological appearances of the skin showed a non-specific vasculitis with polymorphonuclear infiltration and in one case there was a necrotizing arteritis involving skin and muscle alone. Serum from these patients separated at 37°C showed a cryoprecipitate on standing at 4°C. The cryoglobulin was shown to contain polyclonal IgG and IgM in one case, and in two other patients the cryoprecipitate formed at

4°C contained a mixture of IgM, IgG, and IgA. Rheumatoid factor and direct antiglobulin tests were positive in all three patients studied. These findings were typical of a secondary or mixed type cryoglobulinaemia. In two patients the rash responded satisfactorily to steroid therapy, but in the other two cases, both suffering from severe coeliac disease, unresponsive to continued treatment, steroid therapy had no effect on the rash and both these patients died. These findings may be related to circulating immune complexes in patients with severe coeliac disease, or alternatively may reflect a biochemical abnormality suggestive of early malignant change.

In Commemoration of Sir Arthur Hurst

To commemorate the founder of their Society in 1937, the British Society of Gastroenterology has published '*The selected writings of Sir Arthur Hurst*', who was born in 1879 and died in 1944. Sir Arthur's original work in 1907, using bismuth and the then new 'x rays', was a starting point in modern gastroenterology, and his many papers include a classical account of achalasia, and others on such subjects as carbohydrate intestinal dyspepsia, constipation and disorders of the colon, as well as on more general topics, particularly his '*War neuroses*'.

Sir Arthur was a stimulating physician, fertile with ideas, and the British Society has wished to ensure that his name and work are not forgotten. Hepatic Failure

Henry Brown, who is Assistant Professor of Surgery at the Harvard Medical School, has just published a short monograph on '*Hepatic failure*' (published by Charles C. Thomas, Springfield, Ill. in their American Lecture Series, price \$10.50). The metabolism of the liver and its functions are discussed and also some of the surgical aspects of ascites and hepatic transplantation.

Diseases of the Rectum and Anus

This is a paper-bound volume written in German by two Swiss gastroenterologists, Hans Stirnemann and Fred Halter. It is a fairly small book of 253 pages. On the whole the picture of treatment is somewhat outmoded for the British proctologist, and this impression is reinforced in the rather unbalanced presentation of available methods in the surgical treatment of rectal cancer. However, for a postgraduate student this book provides a reasonable introduction to proctology, and the excellent references should stimulate further

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
