Gut publishes original papers and reviews concerned with practice and research in the field of gastroenterology. The field is that of alimentary, hepatic, or pancreatic disease, and papers may cover the medical, surgical, radiological, or historical aspects. They may also deal with the basic sciences concerned with the alimentary tract, including experimental work. The report of a single case will be accepted only if it is of sufficient interest in relation to a wider field of research.

COMMUNICATIONS Two copies of papers and figures should be addressed to the Editor, Gut, BMA House, Tavistock Square, London WC1 9JR. Papers are accepted only on the understanding that they are not published elsewhere without previous sanction of the Editorial Committee. Manuscripts should follow the Vancouver conventions (see Br Med J 1979; 1: 532-5. Gut 1979; 20: 651-2). They should be in double-spaced typewriting on one side of the paper only. On the paper the name of the author should appear with initials (or distinguishing Christian name) only, and the name and address of the hospital or laboratory where the work was performed. A short summary should be provided at the beginning of the paper.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF MANUSCRIPTS Manuscripts will not be acknowledged unless a stamped addressed postcard or international reply coupon is enclosed.

ILLUSTRATIONS Photographs Unmounted photographs on glossy paper should be provided. Diagrams These will usually be reduced to 2\frac{3}{2} in wide. Lettering should be in either Letraset or stencil, and care should be taken that lettering and symbols are of comparable size. Illustrations should not be inserted in the text, they should be marked on the back with Figure numbers, title of paper, and name of author. All photographs, graphs, and diagrams should be referred to as Figures and should be numbered consecutively in the text in Arabic numerals. The legends for illustrations should be typed on a separate sheet. Tables Tables should be numbered consecutively in the text in Arabic numerals and each typed on a separate sheet.

ETHICS Ethical considerations will be taken into account in the assessment of papers (see the Medical Research Council's publications on the ethics of human experimentation, and the World Medical Association's code of ethics, known as the Declaration of Helsinki (see *Br Med J* 1964; 2:177)).

SI UNITS All measurements except blood pressure are expressed in SI units. In the text they should be followed by traditional units in parentheses. In tables and illustrations value are given in SI units, but a conversion factor must be supplied. For general guidance on the International System of Units and some useful conversion

factors, see *The SI for the Health Professions* (WHO, 1977). Such conversion is the responsibility of the author.

REFERENCES These follow the Vancouver system – that is, references numbered consecutively in the text and listed numerically with titles abbreviated in the style of *Index Medicus, Standard journal article* – (list all authors when six or less; when seven or more, list first three and add *et al*): James A, Joyce B, Harvey T. Effect of long-term cimetidine. *Gut* 1979; 20: 123–4. NB: Accurate punctuation is essential.

CORRECTIONS other than printer's errors may be charged to the author.

REPRINTS Twenty-five reprints will be supplied free of charge. Further reprints will be available on payment of the necessary costs; the number of reprints required should be sent to the Publishing Manager on the form provided with the proof.

## **Books**

Real-time ultrasound imaging in the abdomen By M L Skolnick. (Pp. 241. Illustrated. US \$36.20.) DM & S Springer: Heidelberg. 1981.

This is an excellent book based on the author's experience in Pittsburgh.

As stated in the preface, 'diagnostic ultrasound is changing dramatically because of the development of a variety of high resolution real-time scanning instruments'. Thus it is very appropriate to review the present state of real-time.

The book gives a comprehensive account of the use of real-time ultrasound in the abdomen, excluding obstetrics and gynaecology, which are sensibly regarded as worthy of separate treatment. Also excluded is the adrenal gland, because of limited experience.

The subjects covered include the advantages of real-time imaging, with static scanning as a back-up, and a very helpful chapter on instrumentation. There is detailed consideration of scanning techniques and the relevant anatomy in each area, so that the book would be an excellent guide to anyone beginning real-time work. In fact, the wealth of information contained extends its value beyond real-time to the whole field of abdominal ultrasound.

There are detailed chapters on the kidney, liver and spleen, biliary system, pancreas, and retroperitoneum. Needling of cysts and tumours under real-time control is described, as well as the help which ultrasound can give in antegrade pyelography and percutaneous nephrostomy.

The well-chosen illustrations of real-time images are clearly labelled and invariably of high quality. Throughout the book there are numerous excellent explanatory diagrams illustrating techniques and anatomy. This book can be confidently recommended to radiologists, radiographers, and physicists who are seeking a comprehensive account of abdominal real-time ultrasound and to the gastroenterologist who wishes to have a greater appreciation of its role and better understanding of the images presented to him.

The only irritation to the reader on this side of the Atlantic is the repeated use of the split infinitive!


